Chief Patrol Inspector. U.S.I.S.Border Patrol. El Paso, Texas.

This date, Patrol Inspectors Melton R. Rogers and George W. Parker, Jr., and the writer were assigned to duty in the Stand Pipes District of the City of El Paso. At about 6:00 p.m. we gained a position about 100 yands below the stand pipes, a point where the smugglers usually cross the River. In a few minutes we saw two persons come into the water from the Mexican side of the River with large packages on their backs. We then slipped along the edge of the water down-stream towards the point where the smugglers were apparently coming out. When we were about 40 years from the smugglers, they evidently saw us and dropped the sacks into the water. We then called to them to halt and advised them that we were FEDERAL OFFICERS. They immediately turned and ran back to Mexico. . At the time we challenged them they started running back to Mexico, some person opened fire upon us from the Mexican side. There were a number of shots fired from the Mexican side. We returned the fire, firing about ten shots. In about fifteen minutes after everything became quiet, we went down to the point where we saw the smugglers drop their contraband and found three sacks of liquor which contained one four and one half gallon can of Sotol and sixty pints of whiskey, three of which were broken.

The above mentioned contraband was immediately conveyed to Border Patrol Headquarters by Senior Patrol Inspector Chester C. Courtney who arrived on the scene at about 6:30 p.m. It is not believed by the officers involved that any casualities resulted at the time referred to.
