It will be noted that one "Chato" was apparently wounded by the officers, although that fact has not been definitely established. The above-named officers escaped injury. The record herewith clearly indicates that the above-named officers were amply justified in returning the fire of their assailant, and did not violate outstanding instructions relative to the use of firearms. U. S. DEPARTMENT OF LABOR IMMIGRATION SERVICE IN ANSWERING REFER TO No. 4007/3 Office Chief Patrol Inspector El Paso, Texas. November 7, 1930. District Director, U. S. Immigration Service. El Paso, Texas. There is transmitted herewith (ten copies) statement of Patrol Inspector Richard R. Goscia in which Patrol Inspectors Charles E. Cardiner and Curtis D. Mosley concur, concerning an exchange of shots between these officers and an unknown Mexican gumman in the "Standpipes District" this city at about 4:30 P. M. on the let instant. Our patrols have on numerous occasions in the past been fired upon by unknown and concessed persons from the Mexican side of the line. The instant case seems to be either a desperate effort to quickly draw and hold the attention of the officers from an important saugeling operation or the work of an irresponsible drug or liquor addict, probably the latter. At about 6 P. M. on the date mentioned the Chief Mounted Custom Inspector received a report from one of his informants indicating that a Mexican known only as "Chato" had been seriously wounded through the right shoulder by Immigration Border Patrolmen and had been removed to the Liberty Hospital, Juarez, in a dying condition; that "Chate" claimed to have killed at least one officer in the encounter. The Hospital and Police authorities in Juares deay having any knowledge of the case, this however is the usual procedure of these officials in such cases. The report of the Chief Mounted Custom Inspector seems to be somewhat substantiated by a later report received from a resident of the "Standpines District" who claims that he observed the police patrol removing what appeared to be a wounded man with a rifle from the locality shortly after the departure of our officers. Riley Clerk Stenographer BY THE EXAMINING OFFICER: You are each advised that I desire to take a statement from you concerning an exchange of shots with an unknown ED person in the "STANDPIPES DISTRICT" this city at about 4:30 Pl M. OFFICE OF DISTRICT CHESTON on the 1st instant. WITHESSES FIRST BEING DULY SWORN TESTIFIED AS POLLOWS: NOV 8 = 1930 Examining officer addressing Inspector Coscia: Q. State your name and occupation? A. Richard R. Coscia, Patrol Inst SERVICE pector Immigration Border Patrol, El Paso, Texas. Q. Shat was your duty assignment on the 1st instant? A. I was assigned to duty with Patrol Inspectors Mosley and Gardiner and we were to guard the border in the vicinity of 9th street and the Standpipes area from 4 P. H. to 12:01 A. H. Q. State fully the circumstances surrounding the above mentioned incident? A. Patrol Inspectors Mosley, Gardiner and myself had gone up the levee to Franklin Headgates (vicinity of standpines) and were returning towards headquarters cutting sign along the river bank when we heard a rifle shot and the bullet striking the water near us. This was about 4:30 AP M. We looked around and observed a man standing on the levee on the Mexico side of the river and at the same time saw him pick up a rifle and level it at us. At this time I drew my pistol firing five shots in his direction and at about the same time Inspectors Gardiner and Mosley fired several shots at him with their automatic rifles. The man got down behind the levee and fired two or three more shots in our direction. This fire was returned by our officers. Q. From your observations could you tell whether the man was hit or not? A. We sir I could not. However about an hour later an informant of mine told me that a man had just been picked up by the Juarez Police Patrol in that immediate vicinity who carried a rifle and was wounded. Q. Could you identify the man that was doing the shooting? A. Owing to the distance I could not see the features of the man's face but he wore a white shirt, dark trousers and a dark hat. Q. How far was this man from you at the time you saw him? A. I should judge about one-hundred and twenty-five yards across the river in Mexico. He was directly across the river from the foot of 8th street this city. Q. Have you learned of his identity? A. Nothing, only that he is called "CHATO" (Bulldog) and is a notorious thief on both sides of the line. Q. Have you learned why he was shooting at you? A. No sir I have not but information received since the shooting indicates that merchandise from the American side was about to be smuggled into Mexico as two Mexican men in a large car were seen in the vicinity of the standpipes shortly before the firing began.

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Information further indicated that the large car the two Mexican men were driving contained sacks and a box that appeared to be loaded with merchandise.

Q. What is your personal opinion as to why this man was firing at you? A. I believe that he saw us working in this same vicinity on the 31st ultimo and decided to take a few shots at us on the let instant thereby establishing a reputation for himself.

Q. Were there any witnesses to this incident other than the gunman and the officers involved? A. No sir, not that I know of.

Q. Approximately how many shots were fired by this gumman and how many by our officers? A. This gumman fired four or five shots, I fired five shots from my pistol and I believe Inspectors Mosley and Gardiner five or six shots each.

Examining officer addressing Inspector Hosley: You have beard the statement of Inspector Coedia is it true in every respect? A.

Yes sir.

. Have you anything to add to this statement? A. No sir, I have

nothing further to add.

Examining officer addressing Inspector Gardiner: You have heard the statements of Inspectors Coscia and Mosley are they true in every respect? A. Yes they are true.

Q. Have you any further statement to make? A. Ho sir.
